1: Thank you for your dues payment!

As of this morning, WACD had received dues payments from 35 of 45 conservation districts. Your support for WACD's work to advocate for conservation districts is crucial, especially as we face a tremendously challenging economic situation in Washington State. We thank you and look forward to continuing to provide excellent service to our members.

2: WACD Board meeting agenda is available

The agenda for the September 15th meeting of the WACD Board of Directors is now <u>available on</u> <u>the WACD website</u>. The Board will hold a <u>work session on September 8th</u> to allow more time to review some topics. No action will be taken at the work session.

3: WACD Plant Materials Center sales still down but improved

Measured in dollars, PMC sales continue to be lower than last year. As of September 2nd, the PMC has booked \$480,430 in sales, as compared to sales totaling \$737,077 on September 16, 2019. Revenue from sales is 35% below last year at this time. However, the August 11th sales report showed a wider gap with sales volume at 40% below the year before so it appears that the gap is closing.

Measured as total number of orders, we actually have more orders compared to last year at this time. The key difference is that on average, the orders are smaller this year. It seems that some of our customers who typically place larger orders are holding back, perhaps waiting to see if COVID will continue to be a significant factor. If COVID becomes less of an issue in fall and winter, additional sales will likely allow us to catch up on dollar volume.

4: Zoom training before area and annual meetings

We think that it's important for every person who will be attending virtual meetings to be comfortable using video conferencing software. To that end, we have established two time slots dedicated to helping you test your system. Tom Salzer will be available from 3 pm to 4:30 pm on Mondays. Executive Corner

Dear weblinx,

I've been thinking about service to others and service to ourselves. Service to others is what we do in our conservation district world. To be good at it often means we have to strive to be more selfless. That can be a hard thing to do, but sometimes we give too much and we harm ourselves in the process.

That leads me to speak about taking good care of ourselves. We can't be of service if we don't remain physically and emotionally and socially well. I know from personal experience how easy it is to fall into this trap. The new conservation district facility at my prior district was a seven-year effort that escalated to the point of unhealthy obsession in the last year, consuming my days, nights, weekends, and even holidays. At the same time, my district had an opportunity to acquire a half-

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square-mile of commercial forest, something that was on our list of long-term goals. My staff were already working at maximum capacity so I added the forest acquisition to my plate. By the end of 2019 I was exhausted, both physically and emotionally. Along the way, I also put off some training I really had been looking forward to because there just wasn't enough time.

Sometimes when we strive to be selfless, we give so much that we don't take care of our health. Sometimes we also put off those pesky professional development goals that seem to get in the way of getting things done. But those professional skills are important tools in our tool box and we need to maintain them if we want those skills to work well when we need them.

One of my favorite authors, Dr. Stephen R. Covey, addresses this concept in his <u>7 Habits of Highly</u> <u>Successful People</u>. Habit 7 is <u>Sharpen the Saw</u>: "Seek continuous improvement and renewal professionally and personally."

As we enter the long Labor Day weekend, this is a good moment to remind ourselves to pay attention to our own well being, to "sharpen the saw." If we do this, we can continue to achieve the kind of service to people and conservation that makes our investment of self so fulfilling.

COVID-19 Update – The PMC continues to adhere to all of the workplace COVID regulations. Skagit County remains in phase 2. All employees remain healthy. Harvest is still three months away but the PMC will need to be ready to bring the crew on in a safe, responsible and legal manner. It is likely that a lot will happen with COVID workplace regulations between now and then. Regardless of how that all shapes up, the PMC will adapt and carry on.

Finances – The financial reports for August (the second month of the fiscal year) are out. There is not substantial revenue to speak of and most expenses are in line with last year. Two variances to look at are Staff Wages and Seasonal Labor. The expense for Staff Wages are up this year. Last year they were \$50,466 and this year they are \$57,031 fiscal year to date. This increase is largely due to filling the Crew Leader position that was vacant last year. There were also some wage increases. Seasonal Labor went down from last year which is surprising since the minimum wage rate increased 12% since this time last year. Seasonal Labor was \$11,145 fiscal year to date compared to \$17,408 last year. One explanation is that all of the work on weed control over the years is paying off as the seed bank of weed seeds in the ground becomes depleted.

Conifer Seed – This is the time of year that the seed and cones of many of our native conifer species start to mature. Cone collections are under way. Conifers do not reliably produce viable seed year after year. Many species of confers average good cone crops every 7 years. Last year was a bust for most and this year things are looking spotty. It seems to harder and harder to get the species and seed transfer zones that are required. (The photo below is of Noble fir cones.) We will

keep on working the problem.

Life Goes On – The plants and fields at the PMC are looking good! It has been a good growing season. As usual, please <u>contact the PMC with your questions</u>. PMC staff are happy to field your requests and concerns.
