#### 1 - Feedback and Participation before WACD Board Meeting

WACD has three immediate opportunities for members to engage in the Association's direction and activities. This will be our final call on these topics before the April 18th WACD Board of Directors meeting:

- 1. **Legislative Topics for 2023** The Board of Directors is discussing potential legislative topics for next year and what work needs to be completed before January of 2023. We are soliciting comments on <u>legislative topics for the 2023 legislative session</u>.
- 2. **Annual Conference Preferences** The Board wants to hear from the membership as to its preferences for how the 2022 & 2023 WACD Annual Conference should be structured and organized. Please <u>take this brief survey</u> by Friday April 15th so WACD can better prepare for a productive conference.
- 3. WACD Livestock Task Force Last winter, the Association adopted a resolution to create a livestock task force to address the issue of stock watering rights. WACD staff is now focusing on this task and standing up this group. We are seeking district representatives that want to be apart of both the ongoing statewide discussion as well as considering the impact of any potential changes to state water law vis à vis livestock watering rights.

#### 3 - Email System Changing in April

# Last week we promised to reach out to conservation districts regarding the email changes addressed below. That promise still holds so expect an email soon!

Many conservation district folks are using the free Google-based email system set up by the State Conservation Commission back in 2006 and 2007. Google recently announced that this <u>legacy system will be shut down by May 1, 2022</u>. That is going to create a lot of change for

email account holders!

WACD has agreed to stand up a replacement system to help our members bridge the gap between the free Google email service and provisioning their own email accounts. If you have an email account that ends with @conservewa.net or @wadistricts.net, you should receive an email from WACD in the next week or so. #### From your Executive Director

Now that we've made it through the legislative session and the Governor has signed the budget bills, WACD staff can begin to invest some energy in looking ahead. I have been musing about how we tend to break our issues into narrow packages and whether that helps us or hurts us.

In some ways, separating issues may get in the way of coming together as a wider coalition of interests. It's easier to talk about a narrowly defined topic, but it's harder to see how others may join the conversation and help us achieve better outcomes.

In that vein, I've been thinking about conservation district elections, about diversity, equity, and inclusion, and about rates and charges. Is there an intersection of opportunities in those topics? Is there an opportunity to create a wide, strong coalition for a single package that creates more value for our community?

We haven't yet talked about possible overlaps of those big topics. Exploring those intersections and opportunities is the topic of my Executive Corner column this week: <u>Is there an</u> <u>intersection of opportunities for elections</u>, <u>DEI</u>, and rates and charges?

In my musing, I keep repeating the need to retain local choice. My opinion is that conservation districts must be able to choose how to best serve their communities, and providing for local choice supports that approach. That was a founding principle when conservation districts were formed and it remains important.
