Folks with an @conservewa.net or @wadistrict.net email account are now sending and receiving through WACD's contracted mail service. Mail volume was higher than we expected so we upgraded to the highest level plan, raising the caps on sending and receiving.

# From your Executive Director

Summer is almost upon us and fieldwork has already started for many projects. This year, the field season promises to be particularly busy! In recognition of the amount of activity going on by board supervisors and district staff, some conservation districts hold fewer meetings in the summer. This is one factor that went into our decision to reduce the frequency of this Five Things newsletter over the summer season.

What does WACD staff do in the summer? From all outward appearances, you might think the

answer is: not much! However, summer for WACD is almost as busy as our peak months in fall and winter. We remain quite busy during the summer months:

- **Coordinating committees, work groups, and task forces.** This year, we have more such groups than ever, and some have hard deadlines for their work.
- **Focusing on actions required by resolutions**. During the legislative session, WACD staff do not have time to devote to implementing resolutions recently adopted by members. Summer is when we can invest time and energy on resolutions.
- **Developing legislative strategies for the 2023 session.** Tom and Ryan have already been meeting with some partners and with our lobbyist to open conversations about how to approach the next legislative session.
- Assisting conservation districts as they prepare to host area association meetings. With six unique areas covering the state and a new host district every year, this work is often a big lift for us.
- **Planning WACD's annual conference and business meeting.** This has been difficult work the last two years because of COVID-related restrictions. This year, we expect to return to in-person sessions. We do expect to also provide virtual participation. The meeting place for this after-Thanksgiving annual event has not yet been selected.

Much of WACD's service work seems to occur behind the scenes during the summer months. WACD is a service organization, and in that context, here are three quotations for you:
