1 - Remember the Commission budget survey!

The State Conservation Commission recently sent out a budget survey to conservation districts. They do need your feedback so we are reminding folks of the importance of this opportunity. If you have misplaced that email, please contact your Commission Regional Manager.

2 - WACD draft annual work plan

WACD is preparing a work plan for the WACD Board to consider in June. Before presenting the draft for adoption, WACD would appreciate receiving comments from our members. Consultant Josh Monaghan is handling this process for us. Please do review the draft plan and provide your thoughts as it will help assure that the plan addresses conservation district needs. 3 - WACD Board meeting in June to be at PMC

The WACD Board of Directors will hold their next meeting on June 20th at the <u>WACD Plant</u> <u>Materials Center</u> in Bow, Washington. A virtual option will be provided for those unable to attend in person. This meeting will be focused on adopting WACD's annual work plan and the annual budget.

4 - WACD committees are active

WACD has reorganized the <u>committees page on the Hub</u> to make it easier for you to find each committee, task force, or work group. We call your attention to four active groups:

• <u>HABs Work Group</u>: The Harmful Algal Blooms Work Group was formed in response to <u>Resolution 2021-01</u>. Whidbey Island CD supervisor Mark Sytsma chairs the work group,

which has met twice.

- <u>Investment Policy Task Force</u>: President Mumford formed the Investment Policy Task Force in February to develop draft policy that will guide how WACD invests funds. Underwood CD supervisor Barbara Bailey chairs the task force.
- Livestock Task Force: Resolution 2021-05 called for the creation of the Livestock Task Force dedicated to addressing the off-channel water diversion issue. This group is recently constituted and has just started to meet, if any districts are still interested in participating. Whatcom CD supervisor Alan Chapman and Stevens County CD District Manager Dean Hellie are the co-chairs for this group.
- <u>Sustainable Funding Committee</u>: The Sustainable Funding Committee was created via <u>Resolution 2021-07B</u> and is recently constituted. Snohomish CD supervisor Mark Craven chairs this committee. They are currently organizing their first meeting.

WACD appreciates the investment of time and energy by the 10 supervisors and 18 district employees who are working on these topics.

From your Executive Director

Have you considered partnering with Rotary?

What is Rotary? Here's what they say about themselves:

Rotary is a global network of 1.4 million neighbors, friends, leaders, and problem-solvers who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves.

If you're in Seattle or Spokane, you know you have a Rotary Club in your community. But smaller places have them, too. Places like Shelton and Lake Chelan, and even smaller communities. Odds are that you have a Rotary Club nearby.

Why is this significant? Because many Rotary clubs have recently adopted a <u>seventh area of</u> <u>focus: the environment</u>. This presents opportunities in many communities across Washington State for conservation districts to partner with local Rotary clubs on conservation projects. Service is baked into the DNA of conservation districts so this seems like a low-friction way to create partnerships and support among business leaders in the communities served by conservation districts.

Maybe it makes sense to look at this thought another way by asking: what do you have to lose? You aren't going to end up with fewer projects or fewer partners by working with your Rotary Club. You might, in fact, see support grow in facets of your community that desire the services and programs that conservation districts provide.

Rotary's seven areas of focus are:

- 1. Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- 2. Disease prevention and treatment
- 3. Water and sanitation
- 4. Maternal and child health
- 5. Basic education and literacy
- 6. Economic and community development
- 7. The Environment

Seems to me there are some likely intersections of interest and capacity in a few of those topics.

What's to lose? Not much, if anything. What might be gained? Support from sources not touched before and service to even more people in your community.

I'll close with a couple of quotes that reflect on service.
