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5 Things to Know for April 13, 2023

By now you have likely heard about the unexpected passing of <u>Okanogan CD</u> supervisor <u>Albert Roberts</u>. Albert has been a quiet, strong thought leader and do-er in our community for 20 years. Many conservation districts have one or two people they lean on because those folks anchor them to what is true and important. The outpouring of grief and remembrances for Albert prove he was such a touchstone for the Okanogan CD. He will be missed.



A 2015 article in the Harvard Business Review speaks to the loss of a community member. <u>How to Handle Shared Grief at Work</u> outlines four elements of the grieving process for teams that have experienced the loss of a co-worker:

- 1. **Acknowledging**. It's important for the group to communicate the situation that they're in, both internally and to the outside world.
- 2. **Permitting**. When a colleague has died, the workplace should become a setting in which grief can be expressed and co-workers can openly empathize with each other.
- 3. **Celebrating**. Loss also provides an opportunity to celebrate a life.

4. **Choosing**. Grief and mourning don't end overnight. As the initial grief becomes less acute, it can be time for the group to choose ways of remembering their colleague.

We grieve for the loss of Albert and for those closest to him. A loss like this rocks the world for many in our community. We share those feelings of loss and sadness. Such feelings help us remember what is most important. We become more centered on one of the fundamental truths of our conservation work, and that is: people are the important piece that makes this system work.

Please take this opportunity to recognize the incredible people around you. They are — each and every one! — important. Today is the perfect time to let them know they are valued and appreciated.

THE FIVE THINGS TO KNOW

1 - Last Call: Share Budget Priorities With Your Legislators

In these final days of the 2023 legislative session, we are at the point where your letters to budget leaders can be influential. Last week, <u>WACD published a letter</u> to legislative budget leaders stressing the importance of funding for Conservation Technical Assistance and riparian restoration projects in the FY23-25 state budget. The Conservation Commission's financial staff also did an excellent job <u>detailing the differences</u> between the House and Senate proposals, and WACD staff would be happy to provide additional assistance.

This is the moment to add to this work with a letter to your own legislators. Your request for budget support from their home district will be influential and appreciated. Please aim for sending your letter to your legislators by the close of business on Monday, April 17th.


We expect a final budget to be released no later than Friday, April 21st.


