1 - Legislative Update

The floodgates are open and budgets are flowing around Olympia. Both House and Senate versions of the supplemental operating, capital, and transportation budgets are out and now working their way through the legislative process. \$3.5 million in Conservation Technical Assistance (WACD's primary financial priority) for FY 2025 is included in the House operating budget and we are in contact with Senate budget writers. Once budgets are at the point of reconciliation, WACD will know which version is more preferential for districts and we'll be able to advise our membership accordingly.

Policy bills are active while attention is diverted to the budgets. Of interest to our membership, SB 5921 (Commission tribal representation) was not voted on by the House Ag & Natural Resources committee this week and is "dead" for the remainder of the 2024 session. No reason was given as to why. At the same committee hearing, there was an hour of spirited testimony regarding a bill to eliminate the WDFW Commissioners and instead create a single state agency director similar to the Director of Agriculture position. That testimony may be of interest to many readers.

Next Wednesday, the Conservation Commission will hold a special meeting starting at 1 PM in Lacey to consider adopting their proposed Riparian Grant Program Guidelines. This was an action item postponed from their January regular meeting.

5 - Regional Envirothon Competitions ~ Coming Soon!

Envirothon is the largest outdoor environmental science competition in the United States and Canada for high school students. Students compete in teams of five to demonstrate their knowledge in Soils, Forestry, Aquatics, Wildlife, and a current issue topic. This year's issue topic is Renewable Energy for a Sustainable Future.

There are four regional Envirothon competitions occurring in March & April with the winners moving on to the State Competition hosted by Walla Walla CD on May 16th & 17th at Camp Wooten in Walla Walla. Winners at the state competition move on to Nationals which will be held in New York, July 28th - August 3rd. NACD Annual Meeting Reflection

I love to visit San Diego, and I know this probably colors my perception of the NACD Annual Meeting held there. The NACD meeting was a great event with content for district board members and district employees.



As you read about the NACD meeting, please think about what you might have found interesting. I've heard district people say that the NACD meeting has nothing for them. That might have been true years ago but it's not that way now. Whether you are a state leader, district board member, or district employee, there is a ton of valuable information provided during the meeting. Just as importantly, you are able to create and build on relationships with leaders and do-ers from all across the country. More than ever before, the NACD annual meeting is meaningful for anyone in our conservation community.

On Saturday, February 10, the National Conservation District Employees Association held a four-hour training session for CD staff.

On Sunday, February 11, meet-and-greets with soil health champions, urban grantees, and NACD grantees helped district people get ideas and build relationships.

Sunday's Pacific Region meeting (photo above) was very well attended with more than 50 people in the room. This is a far cry from a handful of years ago when only four or five people showed up. It was great to see so many people from Washington State, to renew relationships with peers in other states, and to get to know so many folks who came from the other side of the Pacific Ocean to attend.

Afterwards, a first timers session was held to help people know how to get the most out of their time at the NACD meeting.

Great content was on the schedule on Monday. Breakout sessions included presentations on:

- urban green infrastructure
- pay for performance
- aquaculture
- · nontraditional community outreach
- climate-adapted native plant materials
- agroforestry
- healthy soils
- carbon sequestration
- conservation in Pacific Island communities
- soil health calculator
- conservation districts addressing climate resilience
- unconventional partnering

Tuesday was just as meaty as Monday, where breakouts included:

- engaging youth in conservation
- national baseline data for climate smart agriculture
- converging ag drainage with water quality
- tribal district approaches to food security
- securing outreach expertise
- advancing producer engagement in ecosystem services markets
- innovative partnership-based approaches to conservation drainage
- connecting communities
- pesticide education
- linking soil health to profitability
- a partnership between an ag retailer and local government
- equitable pathways to market for climate smart producers
- stewardship of the Western Monarch
- integrating ag into regional climate action plans
- building partnership between national programs and local implementation

Wednesday featured conservation symposiums on NCPP, regenerative agriculture, and pathways to market for climate smart producers.

NACD committees met, the NACD board met, and affiliated groups like the NCF (National Conservation Foundation), NCDEA (National Conservation District Employees Association), and ACED (Association of Conservation Executive Directors) also met. NCPP (National Conservation Planning Partnership) met following the annual meeting.

The Conservation Showcase had many vendors well known to districts and the NACD Marketplace was represented.
