3. Committee Reports at the Annual Meeting

Several WACD Committee will be reporting out at the WACD Annual Business Meeting. An overview of their work and links to their briefing papers can be found below.

Plant Materials Taskforce

WACD's Plant Materials Taskforce's goal is to explore ways of providing additional native plants to conservation districts. The taskforce met 11 times this past year. The Plant Materials Taskforce briefing paper with recommended strategies was adopted by the WACD Board at their November 18th board meeting. A copy of that paper can be found <u>here</u>.

Renewable Energy Workgroup

WACD's Renewable Energy Workgroup met 6 times this past year. They heard from multiple experts on a variety of renewable energy topics. The Workgroup's position statement paper outlines and defines renewable resources and the opportunities and challenges that large-scale renewable energy projects create at the local level. The position statement paper and proposed resolutions will go to the Annual Meeting for the Association's consideration. A copy of that paper can be found <u>here</u>.

Sustainable Funding Committee

The Sustainable Funding Committee met 10 times this past year. The Committee presented a host of funding alternatives at the WACD Spring Legislative Workshop. Since then, they have identified two funding alternatives that they would like to further explore in 2025. A copy of their briefing paper can be found <u>here</u>.

4. 2025 Legislative Session

If you haven't already, please consider subscribing to the <u>WACD Legislative Updates</u> that will begin with the new year. Each week, we'll provide information about the goings on in Olympia from our lobbyist Brynn Brady, highlight ways CDs can become involved in the legislative process, and track legislation that pertains to CDs.

5. Public Comment Period on PM2.5 Air Quality Standard

Ecology has prepared a draft Designation Recommendation for <u>EPA's 2024 PM2.5 NAAQS</u>. This recommendation includes a letter to EPA recommending that Washington State meets the new lower standard and an Exceptional Events Demonstration requesting that EPA Exclude certain wildfire-impacted data from their regulatory decision. We have also prepared a report on wildfire impacted data from 2021 which is not eligible for an Exceptional Events Demonstration. These documents are available for public review through **December 13, 2024** at the following locations:

<u>Designation Recommendation Letter</u> <u>Exceptional Events Demonstration for Colville E 1st St Monitor</u> <u>Wildfire Smoke Impacted Days 2021</u> cubic meter (µg/m3) to 9 µg/m3 to better protect human health. After EPA lowers a NAAQS, they designate all areas in the country as either in "attainment" of the standard, in "nonattainment" of the standard, or as "unclassifiable" due to insufficient air quality data. Any areas of Washington that may be designated as nonattainment as a result of the new standard will be required to be brought into attainment through a revision to the State Implementation Plan (SIP). Before EPA finalizes the designations, Ecology must submit a Designation Recommendation to EPA, which is due by **February 2025**.

6. Bonus Item - Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration Grant Program 2025 RFP

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) and the Wildlife Habitat Council (WHC)—in cooperation with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), USDA Forest Service (USFS), U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) USDA Office of Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production, FedEx and Southern Company—are pleased to solicit applications for the 2025 Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration program. This program will award approximately \$2.5 million in grants nationwide.

The Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration grant program seeks to develop community capacity to sustain local natural resources for future generations by providing modest financial assistance to diverse local partnerships focused on improving water quality, watersheds and the species and habitats they support.

Full grant proposals are due **January 30, 2025**. You can review the grant guidelines and read the full RFP <u>here</u>.
