1. Save the Date ~ Spring All CD's Meeting

WACD and SCC will be hosting a joint Spring All CD's Meeting on **June 12th**, the day after the WADE Conference. We are holding this meeting in June as we anticipate that the Legislature may go long with all of the uncertainty at the Federal level and with the current State budget challenges. Stay tuned, more information to follow.

2. Rates & Charges Bill Update

Last week <u>Substitute House Bill 1488</u> was heard in the Senate Ways and Means Committee. Although we hoped that this time around the Committee would not re-impose the Gildon Amendment that slightly raises the cap for each population category, that amendment was adopted.

On the bright side, the bill is still alive and will now advance to rulemaking. Stay tuned as there will likely be more twists and turns as the process proceeds!

How to Register

The early registration deadline is **April 1st**, so if you want the best rate, don't wait! Final deadline to register is **May 1, 2025**. After that, no new registrations will be accepted. You don't have to pay right away, but you must be signed up by then to attend. Do you have new employees at your district? Please forward this email their way! <u>Registration</u>.

Cost: Registration for the training is \$800/(\$900 after April 1st) per person. That fee includes registration, 2 nights lodging (June 9 & 10) at Sleeping Lady, and all meals beginning at dinner on June 9th through lunch on June 11th. Additional cost information is on the registration form.

There won't be a live virtual option this year, but some sessions may be recorded and shared later at the track coordinators' discretion. Slide decks and other materials will also be available when provided by speakers.

4. New Interactive Map on Urban Wildfire Potential

Headwaters Economics has released an interactive map that identifies communities that face similar risks to Los Angeles and other places with recent urban wildfires.

While the recent fires in Los Angeles were shocking, hundreds of communities across the United States—including in Florida, Oklahoma, and Alabama—are ripe for a similar scenario. Because it's important to take action and prepare for these urban wildfires, Headwaters Economics has created an interactive map that shows which communities have risk factors comparable to Los Angeles.

5. WSDA Releases Climate Resilience Plan

Farmers have always found ways to adapt and overcome obstacles, but with increasing climate pressures—such as extreme weather, drought, and shifting growing conditions—they need more than resilience. They need a plan, the right tools, and strong partnerships to ensure the

long-term viability of Washington's agricultural industry.

The Washington State Department of Agriculture's new <u>Climate Resilience Plan for Washington</u> Agriculture, outlines key strategies to enhance farm resilience, support agricultural innovation, and encourage the adoption of climate-smart practices. It also provides a playbook for institutions that support agriculture, such as state agencies, local jurisdictions, and research universities.

Next steps:

Actions in the plan require a high level of coordination and collaboration. WSDA is committed to: 1. Working with stakeholders to carry out the 27 actions; 2. Supporting stakeholders as they integrate the strategies into their own operations; and 3. Proactively updating the plan based on stakeholder feedback, evolving science, and changing conditions. While some strategies can move forward with existing resources, fully realizing the plan will require additional funding and collaboration. We are committed to working alongside our partners to pursue opportunities, maximize available resources, and take meaningful steps toward greater agricultural resilience.
