Five Things To Know

1. Rates and Charges Bill ~ Signed!

House Bill 1488 was signed by the Governor Ferguson on Tuesday May 13th. The final version of the bill raises the cap for all district requests for rates and charges funding to \$25, regardless of county population size. The bill will also require the Department of Revenue to adjust the rate every three years based on inflation. Rates and Charges was originally added to RCW 89.08 in 2012.

3. May Washington Water Supply Outlook

The USDA-NRCS Snow Survey and Water Supply Forecasting Program is reporting:

Despite some precipitation in April, the month was relatively dry and warm, with only 2 SNOTEL stations receiving near normal precipitation (Stevens Pass and Grouse Camp SNOTEL stations). Anomalously warm temperatures (see image below) and fairly low cloud coverage in April promoted, in some cases, near or record high melting at several stations east of the Cascade crest. For example, Salmon Meadows SNOTEL in the Upper Columbia Basin lost about 65% of its water-year peak snowpack in nearly 10 days, with snow melting out 10 days earlier than normal. Snowpack and water year precipitation in all major basins have degraded since April 1, exacerbating persistent and pervasive snow drought conditions and precipitation deficits in the central and northern Washington Cascades. Precipitation deficits are now emerging on the Olympic, Lower Yakima, and Naches basins, while lateseason snowpack deficits have emerged for the Lower Yakima, Naches, Spokane, and Lower Pend Oreille basins.

4. WSCC's New Community-Based Social Marketing Project

The Washington State Conservation Commission (SCC) is launching a new project focused on Community-Based Social Marketing (CBSM), a proven approach for encouraging behavior change in support of voluntary conservation. Many conservation districts are already using CBSM strategies, even if not by name. Examples include:

- Incentives and recognition offering cost-share, technical assistance, or recognition such as farm signs or newsletter spotlights.
- Social norms messaging that highlights conservation as a shared community value ("Most farmers in this area already...").
- Prompts and reminders using signs or seasonal mailings to cue timely action, like planting or water conservation.
- Commitment tools asking landowners to pledge to actions like planting native vegetation or reducing water use.

To support and expand this work, SCC is developing a CBSM curriculum and resource framework for Washington's conservation districts. This will include practical tools such as training materials, outreach templates, and locally adaptable strategies.
