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Five Things to Know

1 – Riparian Taskforce Final Recommendations

In July 2023, the Washington Governor's Office contracted with Plauché & Carr LLP to reconvene the Riparian Taskforce. The goal of the taskforce was develop policy and spending recommendations to improve riparian habitat to ensure salmon and steelhead recovery.

The 2023 efforts were funded pursuant to a budget proviso, which funded an independent facilitation process engaging tribes, local governments, agricultural producers, commercial and recreational fisher organizations, business organizations, salmon recovery organizations, forestry and agricultural organizations, and environmental organizations. The Washington State Conservation Commission participated on the Taskforce. The final recommendations can be found [here](#).

Tom Salzer, WACD Executive Director, made a public comment at the recent State Conservation Commission meeting that the presence of a recommendation to use eminent domain to acquire some lands for riparian restoration goes against the voluntary, cooperative nature of conservation district work. On that basis, he said WACD was unlikely to be able to support that part of the Riparian Taskforce recommendations.

2 – NRCS Seeking Feedback on ACEP-ALE

USDA-NRCS is seeking feedback from partners and landowners who have participated in the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program, Agricultural Land Easements. The deadline for responses is Friday, August 16.

3 – EPA Seeks Nominations for the Farm, Ranch, and Rural Communities Federal Advisory Committee

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced a [solicitation for nominations](#) to serve on its Farm, Ranch, and Rural Communities Federal Advisory Committee (FRRCC). Established in 2008, the FRRCC provides independent policy advice, information, and recommendations to the EPA Administrator on a range of environmental issues and policies that are of importance to agriculture and rural communities.

The FRRCC provides a venue for agricultural stakeholders to provide meaningful feedback to EPA regarding a range of policies and programs," said Rod Snyder, Senior Agriculture Advisor to the Administrator. "The work of this committee is more important than ever as the FRRCC helps inform the priorities of EPA's newly created Office of Agriculture and Rural Affairs.

To be considered for an appointment to the FRRCC, nominations should be submitted to FRRCC@epa.gov by **September 5, 2024**, with the subject line "FRRCC Membership 2024." Nominations should include a résumé or curriculum vitae and a statement of interest. Letters of support and recommendation will be accepted but are not mandatory.

4 – IT Help Desk Service is Now Available

Early this month, WACD's Executive Director signed a contract with Olympia Computer to provide help to conservation districts with their information technology questions. This service is structured much like the legal services fund, where a district will receive the first hour of assistance at no cost, and additional time will be payable to the vendor. You can receive assistance for items such as:

- Provide Support for all current software as needed
- Annual technology review
- Labor for software upgrades on workstations as needed
- Keep an accurate library of software and hardware components
- Perform monthly updates and system performance tuning on current devices
- Support all current printers and current networking equipment
- Update router with patches and firmware as needed

I am sure this is a general truth that extends to our conservation district community as well. If ever you needed a reason to extend some grace to those around you, remember that they are going through something that may be affecting them in ways you don't understand.

I didn't get this when I was in my 20s and 30s, but I get it now. The idea that everybody is going through something shows up in many ministries, but to me, it's just a human thing.

For the coming weekend with classmates, I'm trying to put "everybody's going through something" in the forefront of my mind. I'm hoping that will let me cope with the emotional interactions that I know are coming at the reunion events.
